







What to expect when visiting your local library

Thank you for choosing to visit your local library in Limerick.

We have created this booklet in order to help familiarise **autistic individuals** with the library before and during their visit.

Limerick City and County Library Service appreciates the difficulty that new environments can pose for those on the autistic spectrum. A visit to the library will be different from their daily routine and we want to help them understand and **familiarise** themselves with our various branches and what to expect from them.

We have broken this process down into **various sections** that are clear and easily digestible. Each section contains **picture-specific** examples of what to expect, and we have included an **interactive section** at the back with which individuals can engage after their visit to the library.

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We have 16 library branches in Limerick City and County, and you can visit any of these libraries.

All our libraries look different from the outside but inside they have lots of books for you to borrow and read.





Can you see all the different shapes of the library buildings ? Some buildings have small windows, some have very big windows. Some of the buildings are different colours outside.







Glin Library was built in 1829. The building was once the local jail and prisoners were held there. It was also used to hold trials.











Some of our libraries are in old historic buildings, whilst some are in new bright glass-fronted buildings.

The Granary Library is housed in a former warehouse built between 1780-1800. The carriage arch entrance is still in use today.







Rathkeale Library is housed in the historic Carnegie Library building built in 1907.

Who goes to the library?

Families, Moms, Dads, adults of all ages and children visit the library to find interesting and fun books to read. We have books you can read on your own, and books you can share reading with brothers and sisters and parents and friends.















Classes from schools sometimes visit the library to listen to an author speak about the book they have written.



Grannies, Nanas and Grandads sometimes bring their grandchildren to the library.







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Children come to the library to use computers to find interesting facts and play games.



Lots of adults visit the library to choose books to read.



What is it like in the library?

We have lots of books, DVDs and computers in the library. When you visit the library you can use the computer to look up interesting facts. You can choose books on topics you like to read and learn about.



What is it like in the library?

Some libraries hold lots of events during the year. It can be noisy in the library when we have events. You can bring your ear defenders to use during these times if you don't like noise.

> Some libraries have art and craft sessions where you can make a craft to take home with you.

> > Sometimes there can be music and singing in the library. You can sit down and listen to the music during your visit.



Children's Book Festival runs for the month of October in all library branches. Various events run throughout the month.





Authors and Storytellers visit the libraries to perform plays, tell stories and show children how to develop characters and storylines for new books.

When you join the library you get your own library card.

You can use this to borrow books, borrow DVDs and use computers.





The front of your library card is green and the words are in Irish and English.





The library has many e-services that you can use on your computer, tablet and phone when you are at home, in the car or on holidays. You can use your library card to access these services.





Security Gates:

As you come in and go out of the library, we have large Perspex panels. These are our security gates. Sometimes when you pass in or out they may flash with red lights and make a buzzing sound. You can wear your ear defenders if you do not like this noise when you are in the library.

Sensory Spaces in your Library

A Sensory Room is a specially designed room that can help individuals with sensory impairments, learning and development difficulties and those on the Autism Spectrum. Sensory rooms combine a range of **stimuli** to aid, develop and engage the senses.

Watch House Cross Library Sensory Room has a range of **visual**, **tactile**, **auditory and vestibular stimuli**. The Sensory Room is available for use by parents, guardians and carers of children, teens and adults with Autism, Sensory Impairments, Special Needs and Learning and Development Difficulties.

Infinity Tunnels

The LED lights in the infinity tunnel appear to go on and on capturing the child's attention. Eye contact can be difficult for those on the spectrum and the infinity tunnel allows them to explore their surroundings through the reflections they see.

Bubble Tube

A sensory bubble tube is the focal point in the room. Its changing colours, bubbles and fish provide a calming sensory effect.

Sensory Spaces in your Library

Den

ASD children are often socially shy and love to hide and look out at their surroundings. The den lets them do this in the sensory room, it has a dark padded inside and a raised padded floor for safety and comfort.

Grass Floor

4cm long tactile sensory grass is a great experience for most kids especially those in need of tactile stimulation. Sensory Spaces in your Library

Alphabet Wall

The padded tactile alphabet wall where each letter has a different feel, will encourage the children to explore the letters.

Stars

A star projector projects a slow moving blue cloud and 300 green laser stars onto the ceiling and wall. It is proprioceptive and great for eye tracking and raising concentration.

Sensory Spaces in your Library

Mirror Ball A slow rotating mirror ball is an option for increasing focus and concentration.

Bean Bags

Flip flop bean bags are placed around the sensory room for comfort and relaxation.

What you can bring with you to the Library

Comfort/Stress box

Do you have a box of toys and gadgets that help you when you are worried or upset? You can bring something you like with you to keep you company on your visit to the library. Make sure you don't forget it when you are going home with your books.

Ear Defenders

Sometimes it can be noisy in the library. You can bring your ear defenders with you to wear if it gets too noisy, or you can wear them coming in to visit the library.
